
Our Mission & Vision




1889

Washington becomes an official state.



A Historical Timeline



1877

The State Board of **Education** is established by the Legislature.

At this time, the Superintendent of **Public Instruction is** appointed by the Governor.

The Governor also appoints four more members, including two educators. The terms are two years and the Board meets annually.

1897

The State Board and others constitute a Higher **Education Board.**

1909

The Superintendent of **Public Instruction is** elected. Board membership is increased to seven including two principals and the presidents of the **University of Washington** and Washington State University.

1947

The Board is made-up of twelve members who are elected by local school boards. Terms are six years.

1980-82

The Board is made-up of twelve members who are elected by local school boards. Terms are six years. A private schools representative is added to the Board. The Board president is elected by the Board.

1974

Since the mid-seventies. the Board has invited two high school students to serve a non-voting term.



2005-06

The Board's duties and authorities are reconstituted. The Board now has five elected, seven appointed, and two student members. As well as a private schools representative and the Superintendent of

Public Instruction.

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) and The Professional Educator Standards Board (PESB) assume some SBE duties (e.g., teacher certification, facilities).

SBE is responsible for performance goals and standards of performance for the Certificate of Academic Achievement. "Strategic advocacy and oversight" is added to the Board's duties.



Student Board members who previously had an advisory vote, now vote as members.

2018

The Board's duties and authorities are reconstituted.

OSPI is in charge of Career and **Technical Education** equivalencies, approval of **Educational Service District** boundaries, and the administrations of certain waivers.

SBE gained additional responsibilities for private school approval and language that ensures SBE has a role in the review of new learning standards as they are being considered.



Where does our authority come from?



Chapter 28A.305 RCW



"The purpose of the state board of education is to provide advocacy and strategic oversight of public education; implement a standards-based accountability framework that creates a unified system of increasing levels of support for schools in order to improve student academic achievement; provide leadership in the creation of a system that personalizes education for each student and respects diverse cultures, abilities, and learning styles; and promote achievement of the goals of RCW 28A.150.210." (RCW 28A.305.130)

Major Duties:

- Advocacy and Strategic Oversight of Public Education
- High School Graduation and Learning Standards
- Basic education compliance
- Educational System Health, Accountability, and Recognition

In addition, some Board actions are subject to specific and direct legislative oversight provisions,

How We Approach Our Work

Advocacy & Strategic Oversight of Public Education



"The purpose of the state board of education is to provide advocacy and strategic oversight of public education;

- (3) Seek advice from the public and interested parties regarding the work of the board;
- (7) Articulate with the institutions of higher education, workforce representatives, and early learning policymakers and providers to coordinate and unify the work of the public school system;"- RCW 28A.305.130

Rulemaking

The State Board of Education adopts rules (WAC 180), as assigned by the Legislature, to carry out the law.

Legislative Advocacy

Elevate key priorities for legislative consideration and foster community engagement in platform development.

"(4) Establish and enforce minimum high school graduation requirements" - RCW 28A.305.130

"(3) Periodically reevaluate the graduation requirements... Forward any proposed changes to graduation requirements to the education committees of the legislature for review." - RCW 28A.230.090

FutureReady

A multi-year initiative to modernize Washington's high school graduation requirements and better prepare students for the future while streamlining the graduation requirements framework.



Mastery-Based Learning Collaborative (MBLC)

The collaborative is helping 47 schools in 28 districts transition to mastery-based learning (MBL), collectively serving approximately 18,000 students.



High School & Beyond Plan (HSBP)

Adopt rules (WAC180-51-220) for local school district implementation of the State's High School & Beyond Plan graduation requirement. (RCW 28A.230.212)





The Board has the following responsibilities related to basic education compliance:

Adopts rules and monitor compliance with a standards-based program of basic education (Chapter 180-16 WAC)

"The state board of education shall adopt rules to implement and ensure compliance with the program requirements imposed by this section, RCW 28A.150.250 and 28A.150.260, and such related supplemental program approval requirements as the state board may establish." - RCW 28A.150.220

Approve private schools operating in Washington (Chapter 180-90 WAC)

"The administrative or executive authority of private schools or private school districts shall file each year with the state board of education a statement certifying that the minimum requirements hereinafter set forth are being met..." - RCW 28A.195.010

Approve and monitor districts wishing to authorize charter schools (Chapter 180-19 WAC)

"The state board of education is responsible for overseeing the performance and effectiveness of all authorizers. – RCW 28A.710.120

Educational System Health, Accountability & Recognition



System Health Report

Every two years, the Board prepares a report on the state's progress in meeting the goals established for each indicator and makes recommendations for improvement.

"The state board of education ... shall submit a report on the status of each indicator in subsection (1) of this section and recommend revised performance goals and measurements" - RCW 28A.150.550

Accountability

Adopt performance improvement goals, identify the scores students must achieve to meet standards on statewide assessments, and periodically report and recommend improvements.

"Adopt and revise performance improvement goals in reading, writing, science, and mathematics, by subject and grade level, once assessments in these subjects are required statewide; academic and technical skills, as appropriate, in secondary career and technical education programs; and student attendance, as the board deems appropriate to improve student learning. - RCW 28A.305.130

Washington State School Recognition Program

Collaborate with OSPI and the Educational Opportunity Gap Oversight and Accountability Committee (EOGOAC) to recognize schools.

"(3) The state board of education, in cooperation with the [OSPI], shall annually recognize schools for exemplary performance as measured on the Washington achievement index...[and] shall have ongoing collaboration with the [EOGOAC] regarding the measures used..." - RCW 28A.657.110


