




District Population Growth




Free and Reduced Lunch Percentage





Bi-Lingual Population




Special Education Population



- Park Middle School
 - Designated a Focus School (Subgroup performance for Reading/Math for 3 years)
 - Students with Disabilities
 - English Language Learners
 - Continuing as a Focus School for 2014-15
 - Principal Kevin Pierce will be sharing what he and his leadership team are doing to improve student academic performance at Park Middle School.

Phoenix High School

- Population 60 students (will grow to 80 next year)
- Free / Reduced Lunch 60%
- Launched in 2007 as part of a Gates Foundation grant focused on developing small schools to meet the needs of struggling students.
- New permanent facility opened August 2013.
- Choice School Students must apply and be accepted to attend.
- Focus is on serving students who have struggled in other high school settings and are generally not on target to graduate in four years.

- Phoenix High School
 - Project Based Learning Environment
 - All students have their own cubicle and computer work station.
 - Students complete projects for which they earn credit across multiple disciplines.
 - Math is handled via Apex on-line math curriculum.
 - 5 Year Cohort Graduation Rate = 61.1%
 - Lead Teacher <u>Jill Mulhausen</u> will share how
 Phoenix tries to help students get to graduation.

 - Population 530 students
 - Free / Reduced Lunch 42%
 - □ Bilingual 5%
 - Migrant 2%
 - White-77%, Hispanic-16%, Asian-3%, Black-2%
